# PROPOSAL FOR SHORT-TERM FACULTY-LED STUDY AWAY PROGRAM

To initiate a Study Away Short-Term Program, a faculty member must submit the **Curricular Proposal (Section I)**, **Budget (Section II)**, and **Emergency Plan (Section III)** to the Study Away Director via email attachment to <u>elizabethstrong@missouristate.edu</u>. Study Away will review the proposal and provide feedback to the faculty member. If revisions are necessary, the faculty member must resubmit a revised proposal for a second review. When the proposal has been approved by Study Away Programs, the faculty member will be asked to send the final proposal to his/her dean and department head for approval. The faculty member will ask his/her dean and department head to send a note of approval to the Study Away Director. Upon all approvals of a proposal, the faculty member will receive an email letter of confirmation from the Study Away Director.

Within 30 days of the completion of the short-term program, a full **Study Away Report (Section IV)** must be submitted to the Study Away Director.

2. Title of program:

Intensive German Language and Culture in Wittenberg. May 25 – July 3, 2015. Germany, including the cities of Wittenberg, Dresden, Berlin, Halle.

3. Course number(s) and names(s); number of credit hours earned by participants:

-6 hours of German credit depending on language placement level: GRM 201 and 202 or GRM 311 and 312 Conversation and Composition or GRM 475 and 498 Special Topics courses and
-GRM 325 Deutsche Kulturkunde (Culture Studies 3 hrs.) or
-LLT 225 Literature in Translation (Culture Studies 3 hrs.) or
- IDS 297 International Culture and Study Abroad (3 hrs.): Students will take either GRM 325 or IDS 297 - a German culture seminar. Reading materials and writing assignments will be in either German or English, depending on which course they enroll in 9 credit hours total.

- 4. Travel dates: May 25 (leave US) July 3 (leave Germany), 2015
- 5. Countries and cities to be visited: Germany, cities: Wittenberg, Halle, Berlin , Dresden
- 6. Course objectives: Intensive study and everyday use of German language, and study and direct experience of culture through coursework, field trips to museums, cultural centers, and architectural sites. Developing of cultural and language competence through home stays.
- 7. Purpose of travel component:

To hear and speak German daily in order to develop speaking proficiency rapidly. To learn German culture on site, including history, art, architecture, religion, economic conditions, political beliefs, and daily life.

Outline of course, including pre- and post-travel class sessions (tentative dates and content) and all graded components:
 6 credit hours. German language and culture courses taught at the Institute for German Language and Culture in Wittenberg, Germany. Affiliated with Martin Luther University of Halle-Wittenberg. 90 classroom contact hours over 4 1/2 weeks. Grading based on: participation, oral and written exams, short writing assignments in German, group projects and presentations.

3 credit hours of GRM 325 German Culture Studies or IDS 297 International Culture and Study Abroad or LLT 225 Literature in Translation. Each course will be taught by Kelly Schlinder as second block spring course. Approximately 12 hours will be conducted before departure (over four weeks) and 24 hours of lecture/discussion will be held in Germany. Lecture tours of museums, cities, and cathedrals/synagogues in German or English will also be required. Grading based on exams, participation in discussions, essays, and daily cultural journal entries while in Germany.

Content of culture course: German Culture from the Reformation to the Fall of the Berlin Wall. Students will learn German culture on site in the Luther-City Wittenberg. We will study crucial epochs in German culture from the Reformation to German division and the peaceful revolution in East Germany. Visits and guided tours of museums and cultural sites will include Luther monuments, Berlin museums, Berlin history and architecture, Dresden museums, Dresden history and architecture, and history and architecture in Halle.

9. Discuss how student performance will be evaluated: Course requirements for evaluation and grading:

GRM 325. Progressive Quizzes (two before departure and two in Germany) and one oral interview in Germany; presentations (one due before departure, one in Germany); daily

reflective cultural journal in German. Study Away Portfolio consisting of: daily cultural journal in German; weekly vocabulary lists in German; pictures, museum flyers, and other cultural realia, and course essays/interviews. Journal written work due weekly while in Germany; completed portfolio with pictures due after return. All readings and writing assignments will be in German.

IDS 297/LLT 225. Progressive Quizzes (two before departure and two in Germany)and one oral interview in Germany; presentations (one due before departure, one in Germany); portfolio consisting of: daily reflective cultural journal in English and German; weekly vocabulary lists in German; pictures, museum flyers, and other cultural realia, and course essays/interviews. Journal written work due weekly while in Germany; completed portfolio with pictures due after return. All readings and writing assignments will be in English and in German.

Language and culture courses taught in Wittenberg, Germany May 25 – July 3 Excursions to Berlin, Halle, Dresden.

12. Total program cost: \$ \$3,570.00

Included: transportation from Berlin-Tegel airport, stay with a host family including breakfast and dinner, 6 credits of language courses and materials at the Institute for German Language and Culture of Halle-Wittenberg University, excursions including travel and entrance fees, but not meals. Not included: air transportation, personal expenses, lunch, snacks, meals on excursions, personal travel, passport fees, textbooks for MSU course, MSU tuition for 3 hours.

13. Lodging arrangements:

Students will live with host families, except for during excursions when they will be living in youth hostels, booked by Universitaet-Halle-Wittenberg staff.

Prerequisites: GRM 102 or equivalent.

**Application procedures:** Students will complete an on-line application through the Study Away on-line application system. All applicants must be approved by the Program Director through the on-line application system. Once a student is accepted by Study Away, a non-refundable deposit of \$535 will be billed to the student's university account by **December 5, 2014.** Students will be billed by the Study Away office for the balance of the program fee.

Students from any department welcome.

17. Cancellation procedure, including refund protocol:

If a student withdraws prior to March 30, , 2015, a full refund will be made less \$535.00, any administrative fees and other non-refundable purchases made on behalf of the student. A certificate of incapacitating illness or injury from a licensed physician is necessary in making claims for refund. Refunds will not be made for any other circumstances or after the program begins. All notification of withdrawal must be made in writing and sent to the Study Away Office, International Center, Missouri State University.

1. 3 credit hours in spring 2<sup>nd</sup> block 2015 for GRM 325, LLT 225 or IDS 297 taught by MSU faculty member. Students will also receive six transfer credits for language courses taught at Wittenberg Institute.

- **g.** What tools (such as reflection journals) were utilized to guide and document your students' personal development through their participation in this program?

#### 5. Faculty evaluation, conclusion, and recommendations of program:
